Constitutional morality is all embracing: Prof

Hubballi: Karnataka State Law University (KSLU), Hubballi in association with Lawyers' Forum for Social Justice, Bengaluru organized the Late L G Havanur Endowment Lecture on 'Outlining the idea of constitutional morality in Indian jurisprudence' here on Saturday. Supreme Court judge S Abdul Nazir delivered the lecture. After giving a bird's eye view of the Havanur Report, he traced the historical origin of the concept of constitutional morality, the application of the concept in India and a brief genealogy of the idea, comparative perspectives from other courts in the world and emergent patterns of the use of the term in judicial discourse.

He then spoke about constitutional morality, stating that it is an ensemble of values. He also spoke on the need for constitutional morality at individual, group and social levels. He then

spoke on the sources of morality and concluded on the link between constitutional morality, dignity and liberty.

Justice L. Narayana Swamy, acting chief justice of Karnataka, said that to become successful and understand the cannons of law, students must understand the preamble of the Constitution thoroughly.

Justice Dixit Krishna Shripad of the Dharwad bench of the high court said that values make a Constitution meaningful. Former advocate general of Karnataka Prof Ravivarma Kumar spoke on the contribution of late L G Havanur. He said constitutional morality is all-embracing, as people, judiciary, cases and judges are bound by it. Justice Bellunke A S from the Dharwad bench of the high court said that being able to make a difference between right and wrong is morality, and law is the foundation of morality. KSLU vice-chancellor Prof P Ishwara Bhat also spoke.

Knowledge is power: Prof Devy

DHARWAD: Prof G N Devy has stated that the 21st century was the knowledge century, and in this background, the masses had to be educated properly.

He noted this while speaking at a 'Research Methodology Course', organised for research scholars by the Centre for Multi-Disciplinary Development Research (CMDR) here on Wednesday.

Devy said, it was unfortunate that the Indian universities didn't figure in the top 100 universities of the world. Research in the country was of very poor quality and deserved immediate attention. Research was the foundation on which teaching was built, he noted. Thereby, he advised the participants to accumulate good knowledge for a better future.

Karnataka State Law University (KSLU) Vice-Chancellor Prof Ishwar Bhat called upon the research scholars to develop the habit of asking questions, especially relevant questions. Such Research

Methodology Courses were required for better understanding of the concepts in the concerned discipline, he added.

He also opined that there was a need to have both conceptual and policy research, and stated that policy research should benefit larger proportion of the population.

Presiding over the function, Prof G K Kadekodi advised the research scholars to get maximum out of such courses, and explained about ethical issues in research which was so important in the present day context. He lauded the CMDR for organising such an important course for research scholars.

CMDR Director V B Annigeri welcomed the gathering. Dr A R Kulkarni briefed about the course module. Dr Jai Prabhakar, Dr S Hanagodimath, Dr D R Revankar, and Prof Nayanatara S Nayak were present.

Law students asked to have traits required to be judges

HUBBALLI, DHNS: "Maturity of mind, courage, commitment, and sense of justice are the essential traits of judgeship. Law students should inculcate these qualities in the course of learning which will help in discharging the responsibilities of judgeship," said High Court former judge Aravind S Pachhapure.

Speaking after inaugurating a career guidance programme on 'Judicial services: Opportunities & Challenges', organised by Karnataka State Law University (KSLU), and Samutkarsh Trust at the KSLU at Navanagar in Hubballi on Saturday, he encouraged students to join judicial services as the judicial institution requires younger generation to shoulder the responsibility and fulfill the constitutional goal of ensuring justice in society.

He also guided the students on the preparations required to appear for judicial

examinations, and for facing the interview. He also shared his experiences as a judge.

High Court senior advocate K L Patil advised students to acquire the professional traits and abilities of judgeship including impartiality, courage, appreciation of evidence, listening skills, and articulating the reasoning.

KSLU Vice-Chancellor (in-charge) Ratna R Bharamgoudar presided over the function. KSLU Registrar Mohammad Zubair N, Dr Sunil N Bagade, and others were present.

inaugurates hostel, staff quarters buildings at KSLU

Law & Parliamentary Affairs Minister J C Madhuswamy has assured to take steps to improve the standards of education at the Karnataka State Law University (KSLU) and its affiliated colleges, so that they can compete with the National Law School of India University (NLSIU) at Bengaluru.

Speaking after inaugurating the students' hostel building, and staff residential quarters at the KSLU premises at Navanagar here on Monday, he stated that the NLSIU officials have been asked to work in co-ordination with the KSLU in this regard.

"I have demanded reservation for students of the State in the NLSIU in Bengaluru. But, the number of students is less there. I also want the KSLU students to get education equal to the standard of education at NLSIU. Many students of the NLSIU join the corporate sector, but our students become lawyers," he noted.

'Set up Bommai chair'

Madhuswamy advised the KSLU officials to set up a S R Bommai Chair for constitutional studies, as S R Bommai case is referred whenever defection issue, and the case

of unilateral Governor's rule issue is raised. He also assured to take steps to appoint members for the syndicate and academic council of the KSLU, so that it can work in a full-fledged manner, and hold pending convocations. It should become a research-oriented university, so that the intellectual-level of students can grow, he noted.

Explaining the importance of law profession, he asked the law students to have commitment and concern, and to respect clients.

Large & Medium Industries and District In-charge Minister Jagadish Shettar lauded the KSLU for having more than 100 colleges affiliated to it, and he also asked the law students to have sympathy about the poor, when they start practising.

He also stated that justice should be delivered fast in all litigations.

He also stated that the land

acquisition process would start, to build the quarters for judges, near the new court complex at Vidyanagar.

Home Minister Basavaraj Bommai highlighted the importance of teaching ethics in law course. Gaps between Home and Law Departments would also be shortened, he said.

2 study chairs

KSLU Vice-Chancellor P Ishwar Bhat noted that the government has approved the proposal to set up chairs in water law, and constitutional and parliamentary studies at the varsity. They would help for research works, which the varsity lacked so far, he added.

Law Department Secretary SB Vastramath also spoke.

MLA Amrut Desai, MLCs Basavaraj Horatti, Shrinivas Mane and Pradeep Shettar, KSLU officials, students and others were present.

Law & Parliamentary Affairs Minister J C Madhuswamy stated that he cannot analyse Chief Minister B S Yediyurappa's statement that his situation is like 'walking on a tight rope,' without knowing the context. "But, the chief minister did not say that the government cannot be run," he said.

Meanwhile, Large & Medium Scale Industries Minister Jagadish Shettar stated that there is no problem in the party, and he did not know in which context Yediyurappa said so. "Any issue related to the party would be discussed in the party forum," he added.

Home Minister Basavaraj Bommai refused to comment on Yediyurappa's statement.

Earlier, Deputy Chief Minister Govind Karjol stated that confusing statements by some leaders on by-elections are unwarranted, as BJP is

core committee and at the high-command level.

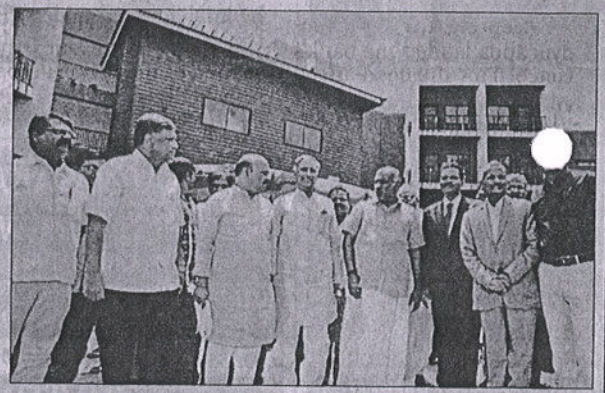
'BSY is correct'

'Our Constitution includes noble aspects of all others'

The Indian Constitution incorporates noble aspects of similar legal texts of all countries, said Justice R Nataraj, judge at the Dharwad bench of the Karnataka high court on Saturday. Participating in the Constitution Day celebrations at the Karnataka State Law University in Hubballi, the judge said that the Constitution accorded fundamental rights to every last citizen of the country, in addition to ensuring each individual had access to justice and equal opportunities regardless of caste, religion, and creed.

The judge pointed out that the Constitution enabled citizens to approach even the highest court of the land to seek justice, thereby upholding the idea of freedom for all individuals.

KSLC vice-chancellor Prof C Basavaraju said that BR Ambedkar, who chaired the drafting committee for the Constitution, had ensured that all citizens were accorded fundamental rights, besides emphasising the duties they were bound to perform.

Former Vice-Chancellor of NLSIU says social justice was the ideal form of justice, wherein power-less people should be brought on a par with powerful people

The Constitution embodies various principles of justice such as equality, liberty, and fraternity and these principles must be used to craft argument to promote justice and help the powerless to achieve equality," former Vice-Chancellor of NLSIU, Bengaluru, Mohan Gopal has said.

He was delivering the Justice R.G. Desai Endowment Lecture on 'The Constitutional Vision of Justice', organised by the Karnataka State Law Un-

iversity in Hubballi on Saturday.

Prof. Mohan Gopal, who is also former Director of NJASC, said that justice could be expressed in two ways: approach of the Supreme Court towards the idea of justice and the constitutional vision of justice.

"When it comes to the approach of judiciary towards justice, there is no clear consensus as the judiciary is yet to evolve a clear workable operational idea of justice. However, the judiciary has developed discrete regimes of justice such as guidelines on Prevention of Sexual

Harassment against Women at Workplace in Vishaka's Judgement and other series of cases on environmental aspects, wherein the Supreme Court has evolved various principles for the protection of those aspects. This in-turn contributes towards standard human conduct providing further clarity as to what is right and what is wrong," he said.

Elaborating on the constitutional idea of justice, he said that social justice was the ideal form of justice, wherein the powerless people, who do not have the capacity to satisfy their needs, should be

brought on par with powerful people and enable them to fulfil their needs.

Senior advocate of Supreme Court Mohan V. Kartiki spoke on the idea of justice by giving the example of dispute relating to river water sharing. Whenever there was a conflict, justice should be made on the basis of priorities.

Presiding over the function, Dean of KSLU G.B. Patil said that there was docket explosion as well as docket exclusion and therefore, it was the responsibility of the law students to contribute towards the justice system by opting for the legal profession.
